Professor Tiffany Condren, Simulation Coordinator, said that this will raise the level of med administration for us in the lab and simulation. This will be a great asset for student learning. Letter from the Chair



Dear Nursing Alumni and Friends, I hope this edition of the Vital Signs finds you well and brings you fond memories of your time on The Hill. I am grateful to all the faculty and students who put this newsletter together to share with you. I will update on a few of the department happenings and great news.

We started the Collegiate Nursing Academy in partnership with Liberty Hospital and Liberty Public Schools. This program provides a year-long training for high school students from both Liberty High School and Liberty North. We have 21 high school seniors selected who will begin this fall at Jewell, learning about certified nursing assistant and patient care tech knowledge and skills in the classroom, sim and lab. In the spring, the students will be at Liberty Hospital practicing all their new skills for 100 hours. Upon completion, they can sit for the Missouri certification exam for nursing assistants, interview at Liberty Hospital for a PCT position and be eligible for a scholarship at Jewell. We are all very excited to help high school students learn more about patient care and nursing.

The Diversity and Inclusion Advisory board met for over a year and half to offer feedback on the program's mission, hallmark outcomes and syllabi content. The goal was to provide suggestions to improve communicating inclusivity and belongingness. The Diversity and Inclusion Advisory board was chaired by Kassaundra McKnight-Young, '09, along with members Karla Calderon-Gomez, '20; Katie Cazzell, Clinical Compliance Coordinator; Dr. Gina Lane,

Professor Emeritus of Communication; Suleman Lawal, '21; Dr. Rodney Smith, Vice President for Access and Engagement; Joseph Saquee, '15; and Ronald Vergarra, '21. Their suggestions, along with the 2023 Advisory Board suggestions, will be put in place for the 2023-2024 academic year along with the American Association of Collegiate Nurses updates on the core competencies for baccalaureate nursing education.

Great news! Help us extend a congratulations for the 2022 May AT and 3-year track Graduates. Both cohorts had a 100% pass rate. Way to go! This year the NCLEX NextGen changed to a Clinical Judgment Measurement Model and new question formats like bow-tie, drop-down, drag and drop and "extended multiple response." Fortunately, we are The Critical Thinking College! Our faculty and students have focused on clinical reasoning in clinical and the classroom. Predictor scores this year have been amazing! Professor Sarah Light is hard at work supporting this year's graduates.

Though the year was challenging, we continue to provide high-quality nursing education. Our strong commitment from the students, faculty and staff is our cornerstone. Please feel free to contact me if you have questions or suggestions. You have an open invitation on The Hill for any nursing event!

COLLEGIATE NURSING ACADEMY

The 2023 Inaugural Collegiate Nursing Academy begins in fall 2023 with 21 seniors from Liberty and Liberty North High Schools. The group will be at Jewell in the fall working on nursing assistant skills and in the spring at Liberty Hospital putting them into practice. The students will be eligible to sit for the Missouri certification exam for nursing assistants, interview at Liberty Hospital for Patient Care Technician positions, and for the Collegiate Nursing Academy scholarship to attend Jewell the following year. Thank you to our partners, Liberty Hospital and Liberty Public Schools.

Teaching High School Students

Taylor Brown, '23 and Kaleena Salazar, '23

We put together a lesson plan on intake and output to present to students at Summit Technology Academy (Lee's Summit School District). The students this service project targeted were high school seniors who are interested in nursing. To help enrich their learning experience, we also talked to the students about how we got into nursing and our experiences as non-traditional students. We taught a lecture on intake and output, why it is important to calculate and which foods count as intake.

We also set up a lab experience for them where they were able to practice calculating intake and output, measuring drainage on a chest tube and emptying a Foley catheter. For visual devices, we made the learning experience as interactive as possible. We placed yellow food coloring and water in Foley catheters to simulate urine and even borrowed a chest tube from the lab with a red ribbon to simulate blood.

We believe this service project is important because there is so much to learn so quickly in nursing school. We love that the skills from this class will give the students a head start in their college journey and help them to be more competent in their nursing careers. We found that throughout nursing school, the primary way we learn is through teaching; therefore, this was a great refresher on the content we hadn't seen since Fundamentals.

We were extremely impressed with the technology available to the students at Summit Tech. They had an entire room of 15-20 highly advanced manikins and were already getting to participate in simulations about heart failure and diabetes. Simulations can be extremely anxiety-inducing for nursing students, so we love that these students have the opportunity to get comfortable with them early. The students were already competent with calculating intake with unit conversions. We enjoyed the opportunity to see the types of resources available to our next generation of nurses and are so excited that such an amazing resource is available to them.

We partnered with the community to teach hands-only CPR at a career fair at a local middle school. We had a table set up with props (stethoscopes, BP cuffs), a bulletin board with fun facts about the heart and two manikins for students to practice CPR. We were able to educate the students on the importance of effective CPR and when CPR should be used. We chose this service project because CPR is an easily learned skill that could save a person's life. This project was also a great, hands-on way to get involved in our community and connect with younger students who may want to be nurses or healthcare workers someday.

We loved this service project because it allowed us to practice the education aspect of nursing and have real-life practice of the "teach back" method, which we'll frequently have to use with patients before discharging out of the hospital. Connecting with students in our community also made us feel like we were making a bit of a difference! Walking out of the building was a great feeling knowing that we influenced some young minds that day.

We were inspired to choose this as our service project after learning about the injury of Damar Hamlin of the Buffalo Bills. This event shook the world because, for the first time, many people witnessed the vitality of CPR and other life-saving skills in the event of an emergency. In sports, where athletes heavily depend on their bodies, we realized the lack of education in basic life-saving skills, so we decided to take the opportunity to give back to one of our high schools and try to educate students on the importance and process to perform hands-only CPR.

The biggest takeaway for us was how easy hands-only CPR is to perform but also to teach. It's not a hard concept, yet very rarely do we teach it to those outside of the medical field unless they themselves express a desire to learn it. The athletes were attentive, asked questions and were genuinely interested in learning, therefore, it's not a boring topic that people do not want to learn. Imagine how great it would be if hands-only CPR was a mandatory lesson taught in schools as part of PE/Health.


